HISTORY

This feature each month will give interesting facts from years gone by. See what you remember that happened in your lifetime.

THIS DAY IN HISTORY FOR THE MONTH OF JULY

5th July 1946

The bikini was showcased for the first time. Exotic dancer Micheline Bernardini modelled the first bikini, designed by Frenchman Louis Réard, at the Piscine Molitor in Paris.

The new item of swimwear was named the 'bikini' after the atomic test off of the Bikini Atoll by the US earlier that week. The US was in a race against the Soviet Union to produce nuclear weapons. In order to test their bombs, the US government cleared the Bikini Atoll islands in the Pacific.



Two-pieces had been worn prior to 1946 by

women in the UK and US, but nothing made out of such a small amount of material: Réard used just 30 inches of fabric to make the bikini – much to the shock of many members of the media present at the unveiling.

10th July 1973

The Bahamas, an archipelago that is made up of hundreds of islands and cays, was discovered by Christopher Columbus in 1492. Columbus' expedition was backed by King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella of Spain. Consequently, the islands were initially subject to the rule of the Spanish Government.

Thereafter, the Bahamian islands were ruled by America for a brief period and were finally possessed by Great Britain. After decades of debate and legal transactions, the Islands of The Bahamas were granted self-government by Great Britain in 1964. This was followed in 1969 with the Colony of the Bahamas becoming the Commonwealth of the Bahamas thus opening the door for full independence.

On July 10th 1973, after 300 years of being a colony, The Bahamas made the peaceful transition to nationhood by becoming an Independent Nation. Since the attainment of Independence in 1973, July 10th has been observed as a National Holiday across the archipelago and in Bahamian Foreign Missions.

Over the eight to ten day period leading up to Independence Day Bahamians engage in numerous cultural and festive and ethnocentric activities and events, all of which are designed to demonstrate patriotism. Among the major events planned to be celebrated on every island are: National Pride Day, an Ecumenical Services, a Fun Walk/Run.

22nd July 1933

Wiley Hardeman Post made the first around-theworld solo flight in the "Winnie Mae," specially equipped with a new automatic-pilot and a radio direction finder, in 7 days, 18 hours and forty-nine and one-half minutes.

He was interested in aviation from his boyhood days in Texas, and became a parachute jumper with an aerial-exhibition team. After an oil-field accident in which he lost an eye, he purchased an airplane and learned to fly it in 1927.

He than became a 'barnstormer." After becoming a pilot for an Oklahoma oil man, Wiley Post flew the

monoplane "Winnie Mae" to victory in the Cross-Country Derby of the 1930 National Air Races. In 1931, he and Harold Getty made a record-setting flight around the world in the "Winnie Mae."


Prior to that, in the early 1930s, he became intensely interested in the possibilities of long-distance, high speed flight in the stratosphere. Later he conceived and helped to design, make, and test the first fully pressurized flying suit and helmet. In 1934, wearing this outfit, he reached altitudes of 50,000 feet in the supercharged "Winnie Mae" and there discovered the jet streams.

26th July 1991

Sonic the Hedgehog was first released. The game features Sonic the Hedgehog, who can run at supersonic speeds, setting out on a quest to defeat Dr. Robotnik, a scientist who has imprisoned animals in robots and seeks the powerful Chaos Emeralds. The gameplay involves collecting rings as a form of health, and a simple control scheme, with jumping and attacking controlled by a single button.

Development began in 1990 when Sega ordered its developers to create a game featuring a mascot for the company. After considering a number of suggestions, the developers decided on a blue hedgehog and named themselves "Sonic Team" to match their character. Sonic the Hedgehog, designed for fast gameplay, was influenced by games by Super Mario series creator Shigeru Miyamoto.

Sonic the Hedgehog was well received by critics, who praised its visuals, audio, and gameplay. It is widely considered one of the greatest video games of all time. It was also commercially successful, becoming one of the best-selling video games of all time with approximately 24 million copies sold worldwide. Furthermore, it established the Genesis as a key player in the 16-bit era and allowing it to compete with Nintendo's Super Nintendo Entertainment System console. The game has been ported a number of times, and inspired several clones, a successful franchise, and adaptations into other media. It was followed by Sonic the Hedgehog 2 in 1992.

Money seized from criminals to be spent in Communities

Police and Crime Commissioner for Cheshire, John Dwyer, has launched a new £90,000 'Community Cashback Fund', which will see money that has been taken from criminals under the Proceeds of Crime Act (POCA) spent on projects to improve local communities.

Each of Cheshire's nine Local Policing Units (LPUs) will be given £10,000 from the Community Cashback Fund over the course of the 2022/23 financial year, with residents able to vote on how the money is spent.

A 'Community Conversation' will be held by the police in each area to identify what provisions and offerings are currently available in the community, what may be missing, and what people hope to see in the future.

Police and Crime Commissioner John Dwyer, said:

"I am determined to show criminals that crime doesn't pay. That's why the Community Cashback Fund will ensure that the proceeds of their crimes are spent on improving the communities they have brought misery to, not funding their lifestyle.

"Having a community conversation in each of our LPUs means we can get a good idea from the very start about what people's aspirations are for their area and how the Community Cashback Fund can help improve people's lives."

After each Community Conversation event, a steering group will be set up to coordinate any agreed actions and consider the issues raised. The group will also carry out further research into potential solutions which can be implemented with the funding.

Local people and groups will then be able to submit bids to the Community Cashback Fund for their area, after which a further 'Participatory Budget' event will be held where residents will be able to vote on which projects they feel deserve to go ahead.

John Dwyer added:

"The principle of this fund is that money is spent by the community, for the community, in the community.

"I want people to bring every idea they have to the table, so please do keep an eye out for when your local Community Conversation will be and play your part in improving your area."

The concert is presented by The High Sheriff of Cheshire Jeannie France-Hayhurst in aid of Cheshire Community Foundation which supports hundreds of small charities and voluntary groups in the region. It is produced by Jo Sykes with artistic direction by John Young.

Jeannie said: "Our Queen is Britain's longest serving monarch and what better way to celebrate such a wonderful milestone than with music and song.

"The past two years have been so difficult for people in the performing arts and audiences have sorely missed live music. This will be the perfect opportunity to enjoy the wealth of talent we have in the region while celebrating Queen Elizabeth's amazing 70 years on the throne."

Matt Baker added: "Britain has changed so much since the young Elizabeth became our Queen but music has always been at the heart of our wonderful country. Some of our performers are as young as seven and some will remember the Coronation – together we will share our love of music and the great joy it brings to everyone."


'Addicted to Football' : My Journey from Anfield to Almost Anywhere"

"Living the dream" to make a career in professional football

The harsh reality, or at times brutality, of professional sport is that only exceptionally talented players are certain of "being chosen". For many players in professional football both established players and younger trainees, the months of May and June can be particularly fraught and challenging as clubs publish their retained lists with details of players being released. In an engaging, insightful and at times emotionally thought provoking book, Jon Newby "Addicted to Football; My Journey from Anfield to



Almost Everywhere", the author takes the reader on a personal "bumpy journey" starting out as a nine year old within Liverpool's centre of excellence structure, with a desire and determination to fulfill his dream of "wanting to play for Liverpool".

Readers with children who train with and play for "academies" will empathise with Jon's personal analysis and reflection on the support of his family in their efforts to help him reach "his goal" and "to see a Newby play for Liverpool". He signed schoolboy forms for Liverpool in January 1993 aged 14 and notes that although he was thin and skinny as a rake, he was "lightening quick". He highlights his success in the Liverpool Under 16 team against arch rivals Everton when he scored two goals, both of which were set up by Steven Gerrard, and in winning the FA Youth Cup and the team's celebration in front of a crowd of 25,00 at Anfield. Happy memories!!

He makes some interesting points regarding his lack of confidence, self doubt and inability to switch off after a game, with "over analysis" of his performance. He recounts his personal experience in an FA Youth Cup semi final tie against Crystal Palace. After winning the first leg at Anfield 4-2 Liverpool in London. Jon recalls hitting the bar twice in the first twenty minutes and being substituted in the last twenty minutes. His comment "if both my finishes had been an inch lower in the first half, I'd have been the hero" highlights his lack of personal confidence and the thin line between success and failure. Unfortunately, it is apparent that despite Jon's acknowledgment of the high standard of coaching at Liverpool there was no mention of specific support or guidance to address his self confidence or resilience. As a result Jon struggled with self doubt on the pitch for most of his career. Most clubs have now addressed the need for psychological support for players at all levels.

Many readers may well have endured the emotional "tug of war" experienced by his parents when he was offered a trainee placement at 16. His mother stressed that he should stay at school to complete his "A" levels, since there was" no guarantee that "football could be a lasting career". After completing his "A" levels in 1997 he signed his first contract with a signing on fee of £2,600 and £250 per week, giving him the opportunity to **fulfill his dream of wanting to play for Liverpool.**

It is evident that Jon found the step up to pre-season training and senior 'fitness levels' an eye opener. There was no sentiment or half measures, "you were either good enough or you weren't". He charts his progress playing for the reserves to training with the first team, highlighting Phil Thompson as a "no holds barred motivator". He progressed well, accepting a two year contract with a £30,000 signing on fee and doubling his wages to £700 per week. His confidence improved and in 1999/2000 season he was in the first team squad. You can sense his pride and passion as he recalls being awarded his first team shirt with "NEWBY" and '32' on the back to come on as sub in the League Cup game against Hull. He then came on as sub in the Premier League game against Middlesborough at Anfield, making his debut in the Premier League with his Dad and brother watching from the Kop. Wow, this was his "dream come true",

However, as happens to so many players on the 'fringe of the first team' or 'the brink of stardom' the subjective nature and brutality of selection dominates their status. A change of coach, manager, playing style, players returning from injury, new signings, personality clash, etc can transform your "position in the squad".

Gerard Houllier the new Liverpool manager considered it would be beneficial for Jon to go out on loan to Crewe Alexandra, "to play regular first team games". Jon's steady progression at Liverpool was curtailed as he was thrust into a "new environment", he describes as "like starting a new school". He is open and frank regarding his nervousness and anxiety regarding working out the dressing room leaders, the characters and support from coaches, etc. He highlights how his "mental frailty" was exposed by the "loan move", including "difficulties in addressing intimidation", the physical confrontation with big defenders", being kicked up in the air all night" and the clash of personalities with the manager Dario Gradi resulting in his transfer to Bury. It is clear that Jon received high level coaching for his physical fitness and footballing skills but only limited indirect attention was attached to addressing his lack of tenacity, determination, resilience and grit.

In an engrossing, all embracing analysis into the highs and lows of being a journeyman footballer. Jon highlights issues which impacted upon his "progress as a footballer", many of which are common to an increasing number of players being "released" by clubs. These include transfer negotiations, searching for a 'fresh start', misleading press reports, getting injured and lack of back up resources at smaller clubs, problems in dressing rooms, taking a wage cut to keep playing, travelling time and personal issues, problems with supporters, in his case at Wrexham! and being released wondering "Where next".

He describes being released by Bury in 2003 as the beginning of the toughest three year period in his career as he addressed the emotional issues of attempting to find a new club. He went for a trial at Wrexham before moving to play on trial for Chester with his former manager Graham Barrow. He then returned to Wrexham on a monthly contract at Wrexham with Denis Smith, before being injured and released. His desire to play football involved writing to numerous clubs and managers. It is emotionally challenging to read his predicament "I was the forgotten man", a situation which so many players have to face as they attempt to 'keep playing'. He describes the process of finding a "new club" in terms of "have boots will travel" as he gets up at 4am to get back to Scotland for training. This was the "straw that broke the camels back, as he moved into non league football. He exposes the murky side of non-league football as he highlights the way he was sacked by Colwyn Bay with club officials acting with no dignity or concern for the impact upon him as a person.

Football to Jon Newby was an "addiction", a way of life which he found difficult to live without. **Due to his lack of personal confidence he never found situations easy to deal with emotionally, particularly poor performances, missed chances**

and physical challenges which match officials did not address. His sacking at Colwyn Bay led to the build up of extreme depression including days in the house to "shut myself away from everyone. In many ways he "felt a failure" because he hadn't had the career he wanted Pleased to say that following his retirement from football and major heart surgery, Jon is now working in the player recruitment department at Liverpool.

The author is to be congratulated on an insightful analysis of the personal issues, tribulations, hurdles and undulating road facing young people intent on realising their dream of playing professional football. Parents of aspiring footballers and academy coaches would gain from reading this outstanding personal contribution to the research on promoting insight into issues other than fitness and ball skills that impact on performers.

PLAY DOUGH RECIPE

You will need: 2 cups plain flour 2 tablespoons vegetable oil 1/2 cup salt 2 tablespoons cream of tartar 1 to 1.5 cups boiling water food colouring

To make it:

Mix the flour, salt, cream of tartar and oil in a large mixing bowl. Add about 10 drops of food colouring to the boiling water, then


add it in stages into the dry ingredients.

Stir continuously until it becomes a sticky, combined dough.

Allow it to cool down then take it out of the bowl and knead it vigorously for a couple of minutes until all of the stickiness has gone. * This is the most important part* If it remains a little sticky then add a touch more flour until just right. Store in cling film after play and it will last for a few weeks.

Twice a year, Chester Rambling & Hill Walking Club organise a coach trip to less familiar territory beyond our normal stomping grounds. Our next such jaunt heads to Ribblehead in October, and offers 3 grades of hike: one up to the summit of Ingleborough, another tackling Whernside, a third taking in the hillsides along Winterscales Beck and the Dales High Way. My other half and I will be leading the walk up Whernside, so we took a trip across to North Yorkshire to check it out well in advance.

Our route started at Chapel-le-Dale, where a track rose gently above the valley onto Whernside's southern slopes. At Ellerbeck Farm we caught our first glimpse of the Ribblehead Viaduct 2 miles up the valley. Even from afar, this magnificent feat of engineering is a sight to behold.

Where the terrain opened up, the real ascent began, gently at first, along a gravel footpath with occasional rocky steps. Soon the climb became less gradual and the track more rugged and steep. This route sees more than its fair share of hikers' boots and where it's badly eroded, work is being done to replace the loose screed path with robust stone stairways. At times these are a tad slippery, and despite being out of breath, we were glad to be going up them rather than down! Higher up, the slope flattened out briefly and, as the sun chose this moment to emerge and the view was fantastic, we opted for an early lunch stop here.

There's a painful sting in the tail when ascending Whernside from Chapel-le-dale. After a demanding climb of more metres than I could bother to calculate at the time, the path rose sharply and just as we thought we were at the summit, there was yet more slope ahead! Keep going, thought I - that trig point must there somewhere...... It turned out to be the most weathered trig point we'd ever seen, with chunks of concrete gouged out from years of exposure to merciless wind, rain and sleet. This vantage point offered full circle views, including Morecambe Bay to the west, Ingleborough across the valley to the south, and north and east were spread other North Yorkshire hills and dales as far as the eye could see.

At some point, Ribblehead Viaduct had lost itself beneath Whernside's limestone cliffs, but it reappeared as we progressed up and over the summit. The undulating ridge along the mountain top continued until we reached a division of paths where we began the steady descent to the viaduct, and more importantly, the pub that sits in glorious isolation next to it!


Whernside is one of the component summits making up the Yorkshire Three Peaks Challenge, the others being Ingleborough and Peny-ghent. In its entirety this demanding route appeals to those who want a continuous 24-mile hike that takes in three mountains and a total ascent of 1,585m (5,200ft). The catch is that this all has to be accomplished in under 12 hours!

This wouldn't tempt those of us who prefer a gentler pace, and time to linger over a beautiful view. Completing Whernside on its own, covering 8+ miles and climbing 500m (1,600ft) in 4-5 hours, was arduous enough, given the steep ascent and rough terrain. Whilst not a walk for the fainthearted, the panoramic vista from the top was more than worth the puffing and panting it took to get there!

If you share our love of the great outdoors and fancy discovering new hiking routes in North Wales, Cheshire and beyond, joining Chester Rambling and Hill Walking Club could be for you. We are a very friendly group who are always ready to welcome new members. In summer we offer 3 grades of walks most Sundays: C's can be up to around 1,000ft of ascent, B's up to 2,000ft, and A grade walks tackle the higher peaks, often in Snowdonia. We are also out every other Wednesday for a hike of 8 - 9 miles, and shorter Tuesday evening walks take place from May till August. Weekends away, summer camps and coach trips enable us to tread footpaths, fells and forests further afield. Then, once autumn comes, our social calendar kicks off!
