THIS DAY IN HISTORY FOR THE MONTH OF JANUARY

6th February 1952

King George VI of England died.

The Kingfailed to recover from a lung operation, and died in his sleep at Sandringham; he was aged 56.

After lying in state at Westminster Hall, the King's funeral was held at St George's Chapel, Windsor, where he lies buried.

Upon his death, his daughter Princess Elizabeth became Queen Elizabeth II, Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland. Her actual coronation took place on June 2, 1953.

11th February 1990

In South Africa, Nelson Mandela, at age 71, was released from prison after serving 27 years of a life sentence, his sentence behind bars split between Robben Island, Pollsmoor Prison and Victor Verster Prison, on charges of attempting to overthrow the apartheid government.

Amid growing domestic and international pressure and fears of racial civil war, President F. W. de Klerk released him in 1990.

Mandela and de Klerk led efforts to negotiate an end to apartheid, which resulted in the 1994 multiracial general election in which Mandela led the ANC to victory and became president. Leading

a broad coalition government which promulgated a new constitution, Mandela emphasised reconciliation between the country's racial groups and created the Truth and Reconciliation Commission to investigate past human rights abuses. Economically, his administration retained its predecessor's liberal framework despite his own socialist beliefs, also introducing measures to encourage land reform, combat poverty and expand healthcare services.

20th February 1962

Astronaut John Glenn became the first American launched into orbit.

Travelling aboard the "Friendship 7" spacecraft, Glenn reached an altitude of 162 miles and completed three orbits in a flight lasting just under five hours.

Glenn was the third American in space, preceded by Alan Shepard and Virgil "Gus" Grissom who had each completed short sub-orbital flights. All of them had been preceded by Russian cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin who was the first human in space, completing one orbit on April 12, 1961 - a feat that intensified the already ongoing Space Race Glenn in his Mercury spacesuit between the Russians and Americans.



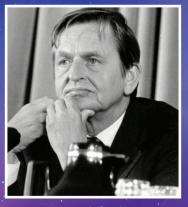

Glenn's successful flight showed the Americans had caught up and was followed in September 1962 by President John F. Kennedy's open call to land an American on the moon before the decade's end.

28th February 1986

Prime Minister of Sweden Olof Palme was walking home from a cinema with his wife Lisbeth Palme shortly before midnight in the central Stockholm street Sveavägen when he was shot in the back at close range. A second shot grazed Lisbeth's back. He was pronounced dead on arrival at the Sabbatsberg Hospital at 00:06. Lisbeth survived without serious injuries.

Political violence was little-known in Sweden at the time, and Olof Palme often went about without a bodyguard.

Two years later, Christer Pettersson, a murderer, small-time criminal and drug addict, was convicted of Palme's murder, but his conviction was overturned. Another suspect, Victor Gunnarsson, emigrated to the United States, where he was the victim of an unrelated murder in 1993. The assassination remained unsolved. A third and fourth suspect popularly referred to as "The Skandia Man" and GH, after their working place at the Skandia building next to the crime scene, and police investigation number ("H" representing the eighth letter, i.e. "Suspect Profile No. 8"), committed suicide in 2000 and 2008 respectively. Both fit the suspect profile vaguely, and owned firearms. GH was a long-time suspect partly because he had self-described financial motives. and owned the only registered .357 Magnum in the Stockholm vicinity not tested and ruled out by authorities, which as yet has not been recovered.

The case remains unsolved to date.

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Chester Zoo and the University of Chester join forces to launch first-of-its-kind course to help save the planet

A first-of-its-kind education course focused entirely on wildlife conservation and sustainability education is set to be launched in the UK.

The new course - designed and delivered by experts at Chester Zoo and the University of Chester - offers a first opportunity, anywhere in the world, for education professionals to gain a recognised qualification in the field of conservation and sustainability education.



Launching in 2023, the Conservation and Sustainability Education PGCert aims to provide educators with the highly sought-after knowledge and skills needed to help learners maximise the impact they can have in carving a better future for the planet.

It follows world leaders gathering in Egypt for the UN's global COP27 where the importance of education in solving the planet's climate and ecological emergencies was one of the key areas of discussion.

Liz Webb, Chester Zoo's Conservation Academy Training Manager, said:

"Education is vital to saving our planet — highlighted by the unveiling of a draft Department for Education Climate and Sustainability Strategy, launched by the Secretary of State for Education in April.

"It has a crucial role to play if we're to resolve the urgent crises we're currently facing in the form of climate change and global biodiversity loss. However, only can it truly do this if we have more and better trained educators who thoroughly understand the magnitude of the environmental challenges we face, and have the skills to engage their learners and organisations with the solutions needed to address them.



"That's why this new course – the first of its kind ever to launch in the UK, and indeed the first education course to be developed by a zoo and a university globally – is so important, and so valuable. It's, at long last, putting sustainability and conservation at the forefront of learning.

"Recently the zoo launched a new 10-year Conservation Masterplan. One of its key aims is to train more conservationists of the future

and empower people to live more sustainably. This course, led by our world-leading conservation experts, is a big step forward to helping us achieve our ambitious goals."



With Chester Zoo and the University of Chester joining forces, the course promises to combine conservation-focussed expertise with first-rate education sector knowledge.

Uná Meehan, the University of Chester's Deputy Director of Partnerships, said:

"We need to stop looking to the past to solve the problems of the future and radically rethink how we're educating everyone if we're to combat the climate and conservation crises.

"This course will draw from on the expertise from both institutions with a trackrecord for outstanding innovation within education."

Educators say it will be rooted in real-world practice and based heavily on Chester Zoo's wide-ranging expertise and decades of experience in the field of conservation, with education programmes delivered both in the zoo and in support of field partners across the globe.

Already, more than 450,000 people participate in the zoo's learning programmes every year and the zoo supports more than 100 schools across the North West to implement a

conservation-focussed curriculum, while the University of Chester boasts more than 14,200 students and offers 550 courses for undergraduate and postgraduate students.

Professor Helen O'Sullivan, Provost and Deputy Vice-Chancellor at the University of Chester, added:

"This powerhouse partnership between the University of Chester, one of the few Ofsted Outstanding teacher training facilities in the country, and Chester Zoo, the UK'sleading conservation zoo, will be agame changer for how the vital topics of conservation and sustainability are ultimately taught in conservation organisations, schools, colleges and universities around the world.

"Our two organisations are sector-leading in their own right and, together, we have created something truly innovative and truly world class.

"This is a course that will equip educators with the skills and knowledge to engage their learners with conservation and sustainability issues and make a real difference and, enabling educators to play a significant role in helping find solutions to the climate and biodiversity emergencies our planet is faced with."

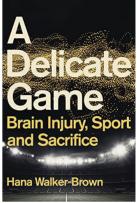
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The Long Term Dangers of Physical Impact in Contact Sports

A Delicate Game Author - Hana Walker-Brown Publisher - Hodder & Stoughton

Within a changing landscape of sporting participation and spectator involvement, by attendance at games or via media transmission, considerable attention has been focused on the safety of participants in terms of "impact damage", particularly to the head, in contact sports such as boxing, rugby, football, Ice hockey, etc. Sometimes the injuries players suffer are immediately and Sacrifice apparent, however, unfortunately, the long term effects and implications of injuries, particularly impact to the head, do not become immediately apparent. In a thought provoking, excellently researched and in-depth analytical investigation, "A Delicate Game", Hana Walker -Brown explores the facts about the impact



and consequences for those players, at all levels, experiencing head injuries. The author emphasises from her research of medical evidence and oral evidence from a range of contributors that injuries to the head, resulting in concussion, are closely linked to the degenerative brain disease CTE (Chronic Traumatic Encephalopathy).

Many readers may well find some of the oral interviews and interactions with players and family members emotionally disturbing. Hana pulls no punches as she relates the disturbing experiences of players and challenges, the response of coaches and governing bodies of a range of sports. The text may well engender considerable empathy with, and alarm for, the players and families as Hana outlines the difficulties players such as Steve Thompson, Chris Czekag and Alix Popham have endured as they recount their experiences of loss of memory, mood swings, in particular, "the downers" and anger. As Alix Popham points out, "you know your body was going to be sore in retirement, but nobody thought your brain was going to be in bits as well".

The playing careers of professional sportsmen and women are driven by personal desire, determination and grit to "be in the team and playing competitively", not just training, being on the bench hoping to get a bit of the action as a sub, or just in the squad". **The wife** of Chris Czekag, a former Cardiff Blues and Wales wing three quarter, makes a significant point when she highlights that on occasions players disguise or hide "concussion" by holding their shoulder in a determined effort not to be replaced and to "play through the knock". As professionals they are concerned about the renewal of their contracts, media attention, being picked to play or that someone else in the squad is "waiting for the opportunity to take their place. Current player redundancies in the Welsh regions, players made redundant by Wasps and Worcester, and fresh appointments as coaches of National teams in Wales and England illustrate the "mental stress" of ensuring you are "not a shirker". This equates with the author's quote from Dylan Hartley's book, when the former England rugby union hooker sets the parameters for rugby players from school to professional levels, "If you're hurt, get up.. If you fall down, get up. Carry on Kid".

Many parents and supporters need to heed this quotation as they read and reflect on the tragic experience of schoolboy Benjamin Robinson who died as a result of a head injury resulting in concussion. As a consequence of Benjamin's death his parents instigated a campaign to improve education about concussion with a clear message that "anyone suspected of sustaining concussion should be immediately removed from play". On occasions, too many parents want their child to be over aggressive and resilient to pain and injury.

Readers may well be aware that sports such as football, rugby and boxing have belatedly introduced protocols to reduce "the risk of concussion". For instance, rugby union have addressed some aspects of contact which have caused "concern", including clearing out, 36 collision of shoulder to the head, rucking, aggression on and off the ball, "illegal tackles"

and the failure to consistently recognise concussion. However, as the evidence collated by the author clearly shows, there is a reluctance by some executives of sports governing bodies, at all levels to come to terms with the seriousness of the issues arising from concussion and the development of CTE.

The author highlights throughout the text the personal suffering endured by Jeff Astle and his family as they struggled with his dementia. The emotional experiences of "denial and rebuttal by football's leaders suffered Dawn Astle, the daughter of the late Jeff Astle, in "her fight to secure justice" for her father, emphasised her tenacity in ensuring that his injuries were classified as an "industrial injury". As a senior politician stated, "what is astonishing is that when it comes to reducing the risks of brain injury, sport has been allowed to mark its own homework, it is seen as a dereliction of duty and must change.

The author has written an outstanding book with a fearless tenacity to "unlock the depths of incompetency" shown by leaders of contact sports in addressing the short and long term consequences of "head injuries". The physical and personal struggles endured by so many players of all ages and their families creates a moving and emotionally disturbing argument for change.

Saving Rugby Union Author - Ross Revburn Publisher - Y Lolfa

The challenges facing rugby union in the current climate are addressed in a thought provoking and in depth analysis by Ross Reyburn "Saving Rugby Union"; the price of professionalism". In an insightful prelude to wider analysis, the author uses comments by eminent players, coaches, medical experts and others involved in the game to give a base line to his analysis of "the issues that need urgent solutions". For example, questions posed include, "what is the point of a scrum if you have crooked feeds", (Jeremy Guscott) and "do we need to go back to injury replacements only" (Warren Gatland). Many commentators consider that rugby union, at professional level, has lost its "sparkle". In particular they note



the increase in "aimless kicking", too many stoppages, replacements reducing the "fatigue effects" of the game, forward dominated attacks, etc.

The author leaves few issues unturned as he makes a wide ranging review of the key issues impacting upon the modern game of rugby union, which some commentators describe as a "marriage of rugby league and American football". He emphasises that the upsurge in serious and, on occasions, life changing injuries due to the emphasis on physicality and the "concussion crisis" needs urgent addressing.

Readers will gain from Ross Reyburn's comments that there needs to be a "wind of change" with a return to an emphasis on passing, handling and beating opponents by speed in contrast to the current emphasis on physical power, contact and ball retention, "box kicking" and forward dominated attacks. He discusses the visionary style of rugby advocated by coaches such as Carwyn James and John Dawes to re-create excitement and enthusiasm for spectators and greater safety for players.

The author's comments are overall far more wide ranging and interesting for those who **enjoy the game** as players, coaches, administrators, partners, parents or spectators.

Readers will gain from reflection on key issues, including

- The scrum half feeding into scrums, the "crooked feed"
- The effect of "strength building in gymnasia" resulting in a distortion in the skill/ power balance and an increased incidence of injuries
- Problems with the breakdown with slowball restricting attacking sides Replacement of players, particularly "battering ram forwards" with no injuries
- Issues to address in terms of tackling that engages with the head
- Dangerous "clear outs" at rucks
- The mismanagement of rugby union in the professional era.

This is an excellent analysis of rugby union focusing on its development within a highly commercialised arena. The author analyses the demise of the game at grass roots levels and the need to move back to a game with the emphasis on physical skill, speed and power rather than physicality and "battering rams" with limited ball skills. In particular, Ross Reyburn highlights the changes needed to "save rugby union", with the emphasis on making the game safer, more appealing and enjoyable to young people and adults to play at "grass roots level".

He was fitness coach at Wrexham RUFC, a fitness consultant with the WRU, weight training and keep fit coach at the Queens Park centre in Wrexham. I know he changed his name, but I don't think he got very far.

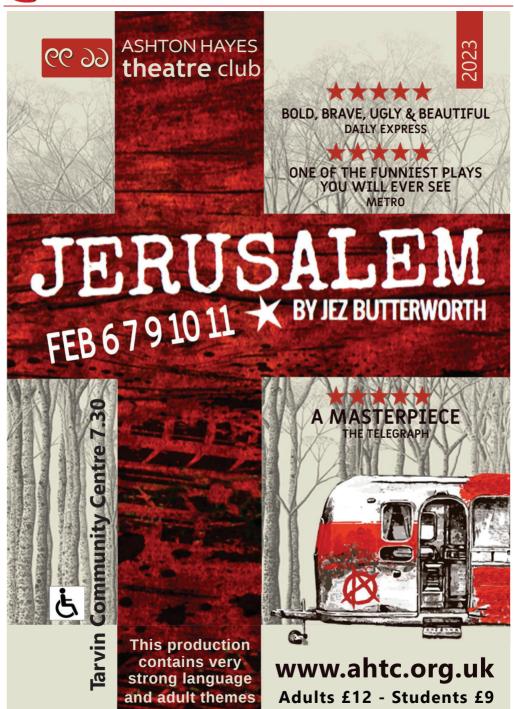
I wonder... did he do it? Did he sing his way to fame?

Well, walking obviously, but recent bouts of wintry weather have meant ours have been used to get us over and through a myriad of slippery obstacles and terrain. During the coldest period, when Arctic surroundings became the norm for 10 days or so, Chester Rambling & Hill Walking Club were out and about, subjecting our beleaguered footwear to snow and ice in the countryside of Cheshire and North Wales.

One bitterly cold 9-mile C walk started from Gresty's Waste Car Park at Kelsall, and took a circular route to Utkinton, using sections of the Sandstone Trail. A light wintry mist blanketed the hillsides and was reluctant to lift itself until the afternoon. An inch of crisp snow covered many paths whilst other, more rutted, and previously wet tracks were icy. Care had to be taken on one or two tarmac sections and a few descending footpaths, where black ice and semi-frozen mud posed hazards to the unwary. Approaching Utkinton, we paused momentarily to appreciate what is normally a fabulous view across to Chester and North Wales, though sadly, both city and distant hills were lost in the haze for most of the walk. Our midday stop was enjoyed with much banter in a field where we all agreed that we really didn't want to be anywhere else on that freezing cold day! Despite being well-wrapped inside multiple layers, gloves and woolly hats, we lingered only long enough to devour our packed lunches before moving on.

Very little thaw took place during the day, although the sun briefly emerged from the mist and cloud after lunch, creating some truly mesmerising

light effects. From one vantage point along the Sandstone Trail, between Utkinton and Willington, the Clwydian Hills could just about be picked out beyond a frozen expanse of Cheshire countryside. This was a magical sight that had us enthralled, until the bitter cold sent us scurrying once more on our way.

The sun, having resumed its place behind the clouds, put in no further appearances, and we plodded onwards, stopping fleetingly to admire a solidly built snowman in a nearby field. Our return route took us through Primrose Hill Woods, along well-used footpaths that form part of the Sandstone Trail. Back at Gresty's, the boots came off and we adjourned to a warm and welcoming hostelry in nearby Kelsall to end our day out.

British weather is nothing if not peculiar. Whilst we enjoyed the sun for maybe 15 minutes in Cheshire, our fellow members, walking in several inches of snow over at Llandegla, enjoyed brilliant sunshine all day!

The following Sunday was, if anything, chillier than the week before. Several hardy members braved sub-zero conditions to tackle a B-grade walk at Dinas Bran at Llangollen, and, nearer to home, a C walk at Frodsham Hill. The undulating and often steep and narrow footpaths on these icy hills proved perilous in places, and anything other than a cautious approach may have resulted in an undignified tumble to the ground and a bruise or two.

With winter slowly coming to an end, our sturdy old boots will hopefully be treading firmer ground, and struggling to maintain an upright position on slippery footpaths will be a thing of the past - for several months at least!

If you fancy discovering new walks in North Wales, Cheshire and beyond, then why not dig out the boots and join a hiking group with experienced leaders? We have a choice of 2 - 3 grades of walks most Sundays: C's can be up to around 1,000ft of ascent, B's up to 2,000ft, and A grade walks tackle the higher crags, usually in Snowdonia. We are also out every other Wednesday for a hike of 8 - 9 miles. Meanwhile, our winter calendar offers a programme of talks and social events.

We are a very friendly group and new members are always warmly welcomed. Whatever your walking ability, if you love the outdoors and fancy meeting like-minded folk, come and join us!
